| 1. The big expense was <u>removal and replacement of the entire 45+ year old roof</u> — long overdue, expensive, but <i>had</i> to be done. | \$ 75,000 |

| • <u>Replacement of the front porch tile floor</u> to the tune of about \$20,000. It looks great and — more importantly — is now safe. | \$ 20,000 |

The \$125,000 funding for these completed projects was provided by:

- A *savings program* we planned a few years ago and
- A handful of *very generous alumni giving approximately \$100,000*. This was a godsend since we would not have been able to complete these “must do” improvements without their generosity.

FUNDRAISING FOR 2010-2011 PROJECTS:

As you can imagine, we need a big alumni dues response in order to rebuild the capital base — we spent it all. This wonderful, charming but old house requires lots of cash.

1. There is a demand to live in the house so we are adding a bedroom at the cost of about \$20,000. It will generate \$9,000 in annual rent so it will pay for itself in under three years.
2. The very popular roof deck needs to be replaced, costing over \$25,000.
